# WHAT'S EXPECTED

Friendship families help Wartburg College's international students adjust to American culture and the greater Waverly community.

The program centers on interaction such as hosting students for a home-cooked meal, taking them to a show, or attending an on-campus event in which they are involved. Even a simple phone call or email to check in can help establish a family atmosphere for students.

The friendship families and students also gather at Wartburg for program-sponsored events in the fall and spring.

# WHAT'S NOT EXPECTED

Friendship families do not house students. There is no financial responsibility; families may choose to cover activity expenses, but most students will have funds available for casual outings.

An international student adviser on campus—not friendship families—assists students with issues such as immigration, finances, and academics. Also, it is illegal to employ a student off campus, even to baby-sit or do chores.

## **TIPS FOR A REWARDING EXPERIENCE**

A successful experience in the program can lead to rewarding relationships.

A little bit of planning and effort can go a long way:

- Friendship families are encouraged to research their student's home country to become aware of potential differences in culture, religion, diet, and time management.
- Ask the student what name to use, and be sure of the pronunciation.
- Take the lead in communication, especially until the student feels comfortable reaching out.
- When discussing current affairs or the student's country, try to be open-minded and refrain from strong positions that could be offensive or alter the nature of the relationship.
- Students may need assistance or desire socialization during breaks in the academic year.
  Friendship families can help by maintaining more frequent contact during these periods.
- Families may even offer summer storage and rides to the airport.
