### Dr. Rebecca Neiduski

Dr. Rebecca Neiduski became the 18th president of Wartburg College on July 1, 2022, after five years as the dean of the School of Health Sciences at Elon University in Elon, N.C.

While there, she led efforts to establish the first undergraduate majors in the School of Health Sciences and an accelerated pathways program that dovetails undergraduate and graduate curricula. She helped execute Elon's most recent strategic plan and served as co-chair of one of the plan's working groups. She also advanced diversity, equity, and inclusion efforts within the School of Health Sciences by championing the establishment of committees that engaged students, faculty, and staff in monthly educational events; empowered structural change in hiring and admissions processes; and built curricular and co-curricular opportunities dedicated to advancing health equity.



Prior to her work at Elon, President Neiduski was the chair and program director for the Department of Occupational Therapy and a professor of occupational therapy at Concordia University Wisconsin from 2013 to 2017 and an associate professor of occupational therapy with tenure at Maryville University from 2002 to 2013.

A certified hand therapist and international expert in flexor tendon rehabilitation, President Neiduski has offered many lectures, courses, and keynote addresses on best practices for this complex diagnosis as well as authored multiple peer-reviewed publications and book chapters. She also is known for her commitment to global health equity, including both sustainable humanitarian work and education of health care providers around the world. She has been honored with both the Nathalie Barr Lectureship Award and the Paul Brand Award for Professional Excellence from the American Society of Hand Therapists.

President Neiduski also sits on the board of directors for the Guatemala Healing Hands Foundation, where she has provided leadership and substantive contributions through education, provision of specialized surgery and therapy, and community outreach. The organization completes significant fundraising every 18 months so that its highly specialized team of surgeons, therapists, anesthesiologists, nurses, and volunteers can provide comprehensive training and education to health care providers and students; screen more than 200 children with traumatic injuries and congenital limb differences who would otherwise not have access to specialized surgeries; and provide training for and maintain connection with local therapists who provide post-operative care.

She earned a Bachelor of Arts in movement and sport science from Purdue University, a Master of Science in occupational therapy from Washington University in St. Louis, and a Doctor of Philosophy in education from Saint Louis University.

In her free time, she enjoys reading, cooking, outdoor activities, and traveling.



### The Wartburg College Geal

The seal of Wartburg College is the Luther rose, which Martin Luther used as a symbol of his beliefs. The cross at the center of a heart illustrates Luther's conviction that we live by faith in Jesus Christ. The rose flowering around the heart represents the peace and joy that result from such faith. The outer ring, a circle without beginning or end, is a reminder that God's gifts and blessings are everlasting.







Leading the academic procession today is a ceremonial mace, a symbol of Wartburg College's history designed by Arthur C. Frick, professor emeritus of art.

Like the ancient Roman standard bearer or the legendary monarch, a mace leads a ceremony with tradition and grandeur. The Wartburg mace stands 80 inches tall and features an ornate cross, signifying Wartburg's heritage as a college of the church. Six smaller crosses projecting from the mace symbolize the six previous locations of the college. The style of the crosses is consistent with Wartburg's German heritage. Orange and black stones incorporated on the main cross and the base represent the official college colors.

The walnut staff features an engraving of the words "Faith and Learning," main elements of the college mission statement. The Luther rose is placed prominently at the center of the main cross as the official seal of the college.

### Chain of Office and Presidential Medallion

The Presidential Medallion was designed for the inauguration of President John Bachman by Sacred Design Associates, Minneapolis. It represents Wartburg's role as a college of the church in creating an educational environment that integrates a spirit of inquiry and exploration with a foundation of faith and values. Flames at the top of the design represent the Holy Spirit descending toward the Christian symbol of the cross. The atomic structure in the center and the leaves below it symbolize mankind's intellectual search for knowledge



in all creation. Together, the design elements reflect the ultimate unity of all things under God.

The Presidential Medallion hangs from a Chain of Office created for the inauguration of President Jack R. Ohle. The round links on the chain are engraved with the names and years of service of Wartburg's 17 past presidents. Each features the Wartburg College Seal with the Luther rose in the center.

### Academic Regalia

The academic attire worn for ceremonial events at colleges and universities dates back to the Middle Ages, first in the church and then in the guilds. The teaching guild was the Guild of the Master of Arts, where the Bachelor was the apprentice of the Master and the dress was the outward sign of privilege and responsibility.

Principal features of academic dress are the gown, the cap, and the hood. It became necessary for universities to set rules to preserve the dignity and meaning of the academic dress. Since the 15th century, both Cambridge and Oxford have made academic dress a matter of university control, even in its minor details, and have repeatedly published revised regulations. American universities agreed on a definitive system in 1895. In 1932, the American Council of Education presented a revised code, which, for the most part, governs the style of academic dress today.

THE GOWN: The flowing gown comes from the 12th century. While it originally was worn as protection against the cold of unheated buildings, today it has become symbolic of the democracy of scholarship, for it covers any dress of rank or social standing underneath. It is black for all degrees, with pointed sleeves for the bachelor's degree, long closed sleeves with a slit at the arm or wrist for the master's degree, and full bell-double sleeves for the doctor's degree. Bachelor's and master's gowns have no trimming. For the doctor's degree, the gown is faced down the front with velvet and has three bars of velvet across the sleeves in the color distinctive of the faculty or discipline to which the degree pertains.

THE CAP: When slaves were freed under Roman law, they won the privilege of wearing a cap. Thus, the academic cap is a sign of freedom of scholarship and the responsibility and dignity with which scholarship endows the wearer. The cap of scholarship is square to symbolize the book, according to old poetry. The color of the tassel denotes the discipline.

THE HOOD: The hood is trimmed with one or more chevrons of a secondary color on the ground of the primary color of the college. ### Wartburg College

Wartburg College traces its roots to 1852, when Pastor Wilhelm Löhe of Neuendettelsau, Bavaria, sent Georg Grossmann and five students to found a teacher-training school for German immigrants in Saginaw, Mich. The college moved several times before making its permanent home in Waverly in 1935.

The college is named after the Wartburg Castle in Eisenach, Germany. A center of art and culture during the Middle Ages, the castle was home to St. Elizabeth in the 13th century and was a refuge for Martin Luther during the stormy days of the 16th-century Reformation. The castle is a frequent destination for students and alumni, and a formal agreement between the college and the Wartburg Castle Foundation provides ongoing academic and cultural exchanges between Eisenach and the Wartburg campus. Waverly and Eisenach are Sister Cities, further strengthening the bonds between the two communities.

Wartburg's 2022-23 enrollment of 1,444 includes students from 38 U.S. states and 55 countries. Dedicated to challenging and nurturing students for lives of leadership and service, the college is characterized by vigorous academic expectations within an environment of strong personal support.

Community engagement has become nationally and internationally recognized as a hallmark of the Wartburg experience. The Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching recognizes Wartburg among colleges that foster experiential learning and community engagement.

Wartburg is listed in *U.S. News and World Report's* edition of *America's Best Colleges* and *The Princeton Review's* ranking of *Best Midwestern Colleges*. Its 118-acre campus includes more than 30 buildings. Old Main, built in 1880 and renovated in 1986, and the 25-acre historic campus core are listed on the National Register of Historic Places. The newest facilities include the McCoy Living & Learning Center, which was dedicated in October 2016, and the Meyer Strength & Conditioning Annex, which was completed in 2021. The McCoy Living & Learning Center encompasses the renovated Clinton Hall, a residence hall built in 1957, and an east-side addition that features a faculty apartment. The annex, a two-story addition to the Wartburg-Waverly Sports & Wellness Center, features 17 weight platforms and expanded areas for strength and conditioning activities.

The college currently is renovating Slife (formerly Centennial) and Vollmer halls into the newly named Ubuntu Center, which were constructed about 70 years ago. The \$11 million project features a new HVAC system that will allow for air conditioning in individual rooms, new restroom and shower facilities, a new fire sprinkler system, and an electrical and plumbing overhaul. An elevator and rooms that combine individual sleeping spaces with bathrooms will make the building more accessible for all.
